

Rhododendron

Unlike earlyblooming hybrids, rhododendrons in the Pocono Mountains bloom in June. They are common along creeks and streams,

where their shade helps keep the water cool and safe for trout.



Forest Layers

There are four levels in a forest. From bottom to top,

they are the herbaceous and shrub layers, the understory, and the canopy.

Lowbush Blueberry

This species of blueberry is native to Pennsylvania, and is the state fruit of Maine. This plant is a spreading deciduous shrub with glossy blue-green leaves that turn purple in the fall. The



Lichens

Lichens are actually two organisms, fungi and algae, living in symbiosis – each benefits




the other. Although they often have plant-like properties, lichens are not plants. Like plants, however, they produce their own food by photosynthesis. There are over 20,000 species of lichens, and they cover about 6% of the earth's surface.



Animals

Deer are common inhabitants of this area. Other animals include chipmunks, rabbits, and squirrels. Search for signs of animal activity, like tracks, droppings, and flattened grasses.

Deciduous Trees

Deciduous trees lose their leaves annually, and include maple and oak trees. You will see the telltale sign of acorns under oak trees. Other species nearby include the American beech, which has smooth, light gray bark, and birch trees, which have white bark.




Forest Hills Run


Eastern Hemlock

The long-lived eastern hemlock is the state tree of Pennsylvania, with the oldest recorded tree reaching almost 1000 years old. Their bark was historically used for teas and medicine. Today, hemlocks are threatened by an invasive, destructive insect called a wooly adelgid.



Stream Features

There are three main parts of a stream. Riffles are stream segments in which fast water flows over rocks, providing oxygen for fish and other aquatic animals.





Conservation

When meadows and other open spaces are undisturbed, the land protects water quality in nearby creeks and streams. They also provide habitat for wildlife, including native and migratory birds. Be a good steward of land and water!
